

4. Much of this book revolves around the ocean. What would you say are some of the messages of the book about oceans? Comment on how the ocean was portrayed.

5. What did you think of the female diver, Evelyne, in the book? She was based on a real person. Have you read about her before? If not, does this book inspire you to do so?

6. What has been your experience with the ocean? Have you ever scuba dived and/or snorkeled? If so, what did you see in the ocean?

7. Some people have been confused about this novel and the various storylines and how they relate. Were you confused? If so, what questions do you have about this book? Does it help to know that some of it was supposedly written in an AI perspective? Why or why not?

8. Some of the themes in this book included white privilege and colonialism. How did that affect the lives of the characters?

9. When the island inhabitants of Makatea had to vote on whether or not to agreed to the floating sea project, what did you hope they would decide? Why?

10. What happened in the relationship between Todd and Rafi? Do you think they reconciled? Why or why not?

11. What do the MAMs have to say about the book? Whom do you agree with?

Because AI is one of the voices, it's somewhat difficult to separate the truth of the novel from its alternative fiction. Impressive in scope and the underlying research which provides a disturbing commentary on our present and future.
